Spectacular Trails in Green Mountain Falls

Green Mountain Falls, Colorado

Catamount Trail

2 miles, natural

Hike one block west from town along Ute Pass Ave and turn left on Hondo Ave. Hike past the gate to the water tank. The trailhead for Catamount and the Thomas trails is on the left and share a route for a short ways. This trail was completely rebuilt by Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado in 1997. Huge granite outcroppings and lush vegetation make this an unforgettable hike. Make sure you hike to the Garden of Eden and to the overlook. Once you pass the Garden of Eden, you can reach the North and South Catamount Reservoirs. Be warned, this is a day use only area. It is steep, levels out and then becomes steep again.

Thomas Trail

3 miles, natural—hikers only

Take Lake St. near the lake gazebo and hike south along Ute Pass Ave. , turn right on Hotel St, then left on Park Ave. and right on

Boulder to find the trailhead at the end of Boulder.

Historic trail that will take you through by the area's older structures and to Crystal and Catamount Falls. Steep, slippery and should be used with great caution.

Ute Pass Trail

8 miles; gravel and paved

Ute Pass Trail can be reached from west Hwy. 24 at the Green Mountain Falls Elementary School on Chipita Park Rd.. The part in Woodland Park can be reached behind Safeway on Hwy. 24.

This trail is currently completed from the Green Mountain Falls Elementary school to the Village of Green Mountain Falls. Additional trail has been completed in Woodland Park behind Safeway. The trail has also been built between Woodland Park and Divide (It is a road shoulder as you leave Woodland Park until you get to Edlowe Rd.) It is a key segment of the American Discovery Trail and the America the Beautiful Trail.
